### **Opening Up Education - Better education for a better life**

Between 50% and 80% of students in EU countries never use digital textbooks, exercise software, broadcasts/podcasts, simulations or learning games. Most teachers at primary and secondary level do not consider themselves as 'digitally confident' or able to teach digital skills effectively, and 70% would like more training in using ICTs.

## Digitising European Society – Member state and European progress towards a Digital Economy and Society according to the DESI (Digital Economy and Society Index)

Digital Technologies are transforming Europe's society and economy and are changing the labour markets. The Digital Economy and Society Index (DESI) tracks the progress of EU countries towards a digital economy and society. It is composed of 30+ indicators grouped into five policy areas: Connectivity (how widespread, fast and affordable broadband is), Human Capital (the digital skills of the population and workforce), Use of Internet (the use of online activities from news to banking or shopping), Integration of Digital Technology (how businesses integrate key digital technologies, such as e-invoices, cloud services, e-commerce, etc.) and Digital Public Services (such as e-government and e-health). This session will present the index and the main progress statistics for the EU and member states.
